Lake Erie & Why I Do What I Do with Tom Henry 1:30 p.m. Thursday, June 27 Chautauqua Hall

From water quality to climate change, western Lake Erie and its mammoth Maumee River watershed are ground zero for Great Lakes research — by far the warmest, shallowest and most dynamic part of the world's biggest lake system.

In this program, Tom Henry, longtime environmental writer for *The Blade* will talk about the lake's unique convergence of human and wildlife impacts, such as shipping, automobile manufacturing, tourism, fishing, birding and big agriculture, as well as some of the people and personalities who have shaped his career and his vision of this global treasure.

Confused about what light bulb provides the best light energy for less money? Jim Switzer, Lakeside homeowner and advisor to his neighborhood, has studied this dilemma. See how a twist of the wrist can save energy and money in your cottage and at home. <u>Home Lighting Options for Energy Conservation</u>

Switzer will evaluate wattage equivalents and light temperatures such as soft white, bright white and dimmable versus non-dimmable bulbs. Hazardous Waste Recycling Day

9 a.m.-12 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 31

Lakeside Schoolhouse

Society (LESS) volunteers will collect hazardous household materials, including all types of paint, aerosol cans, paint-related materials, motor oil, all household batteries, hand-held propane tanks, antifreeze, fluorescent and compact fluorescent bulbs, household cleaners and pesticides.

The collected materials will be transported to the Ottawa County Solid Waste Recycling Center in Oak Harbor, Ohio. To assist LESS with pick-up and transport of these materials, contact Jim Heikes at (937) 470-1800.
